Music from Poland ... Choral Director David Chase

It must have been 1966 or '67 when I was first drawn into Polish music by the ultimate "driveway moment." Driving in my green VW bug-a directimport, the only state-of-the-art component of which was its wonderful Blaupunkt radio—I had tuned into the midst of a work of gripping power: layers of chant-like voices building dissonant clusters of 12-tone chords that nearly sucked the breath out of me. I pulled into my driveway and listened, spellbound, as the clusters built and built and finally exploded into a D major triad. What had changed my way of hearing music, I learned from the announcer, was the Stabat Mater of Krystof Penderecki, the unaccompanied choral movement of his huge and revolutionary work, The St. Luke Passion.

Years later I would conduct La Jolla Symphony Chorus in that *Stabat Mater*, in Sherwood

Auditorium. And after that, I would meet a new faculty colleague at Palomar College, Dr. Peter Gach, who had lived and studied in Poland. He was a consummate proponent of Fryderyk Chopin and he also championed the music of Karol Szymanowski, the 20th century composer who had greatly enriched Polish music with his own interpretation of its national character.

Two other experiences have led to the present performance: A 2001 chorus tour of Poland and the subsequent guest conducting of our chorus and orchestra by the exciting young conductor from Białystok, Marcin Nałęcz-Niesiołowski. The accompanying article by Beda Farrell chronicles the tour adventures. What Marcin brought to us was Szymanowski's choral masterpiece, the *Stabat Mater*, which concludes our present program.

All of this history seems to lead explicitly to our present program of Music from Poland.

Our concert begins with a brief new work of Penderecki – not the dissonant music of the '60s, but the burnished, autumnal style of his later years, here applied to the baroque form, the *Chaconne*. It was written in memory of his friend, Pope John Paul II. We follow that with two important works of Szymanowski, both among his last large compositions. Peter Gach plays the *Sinfonia Concertante*, which the composer himself played all over Europe, but was dedicated to his great friend, Arthur Rubenstein. It's full of *mazurka* themes and references to the folk music of the Tatra Mountains, which he especially loved. But is also absolute music informed by brilliant impressionistic orchestration.

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Finally the chorus joins the orchestra and our soloists in the *Stabat Mater*. It is an utterly unique composition, clearly Szymanowski's response to Jankowski's highly-charged Polish version of the *Stabat Mater*, itself one of the most dramatic texts in the Christian Tradition. The choral writing is a highly original combination of archaic techniques, which he learned from studying pre-sixteenth-century choral music, and modern ideas that he learned in Paris from his Impressionist colleagues.

There is an unusual arch to this concert: It begins with the elegiac *Chaconne* and ends with the lamentations of the *Stabat Mater*, surrounding a colorful and exciting *Concertante*. This gives the overall program a certain dark, luminous quality. I hope it represents something of the Polish soul.



Voices from America and music from Poland ... Beda Farrell

In July 2001, Choral Director David Chase, a 44-member chamber chorus and 11-member string ensemble traveled to central Europe, making the fifth concert tour for singers and second for string players. As representatives of the La Jolla Symphony and Chorus, our musicians shared some beautiful music of the Americas with the people of the Czech Republic and Poland.

We derived great pleasure in presenting our "Voices from America" concerts in Prague and Třeboň in the Czech Republic; and in Wrocław, Kraków and Warsaw, Poland. Each concert was different and exciting...from no electricity in a mausoleum chapel in Třeboň, to intermittent electricity (we overloaded circuit breakers in Wrocław's St. Mary Magdalene Cathedral), to marvelous concert halls and our final concert in a gothic style church in the center of the former Warsaw ghetto. In addition we, and our families, saw marvelous sights and met some wonderful people along the way.

Audiences loved hearing the music of North and South America, and showed their



appreciation with loud applause for the musicians and huge bouquets for Maestro Chase. We truly felt like the official Cultural Ambassadors of San Diego as proclaimed by then Mayor Dick Murphy and the San Diego City Council. With enthusiastic assistance from local San Diego residents and LJS&C patrons Dr. Zofia Dziewanowska and Dr. Jerzy Barankiewicz, we also became ambassadors of the San Diego-Warsaw and Mazovia Province Sister Society.

Through their efforts we made a special connection with the people of Poland.

The high point of our tour came in Warsaw where we were fêted by the Mazovia Province Governor's staff and by Sister City representatives from the city of Warsaw. Our final performance was in front of 1,400 people in the St. Augustine Church. There was standing room only inside the church, the lobby was filled, and those who couldn't fit into the lobby stood outside in the rain to hear our concert!

It was through our musical connections in Poland that we brought the talented, young conductor Marcin Nałęcz-Niesiołowski to San Diego the following year, where he conducted the La Jolla Symphony and Chorus in outstanding performances of Polish and Russian composers. This is a small world indeed, especially when the love of good music brings us together. In Mandeville Auditorium this weekend we share with you the music of Poland once again, with the music of Penderecki and Szymanowski, conducted by David Chase and featuring Polish-American pianist Peter Gach, and wish you miłego posłuchania! (Pleasant listening!)



Join Jim Swift on an Arctic Ocean Research Cruise aboard the US Icebreaker Healy & Benefit LJS&C!

Sail as a working volunteer - a full science participant - on a summer 2010 Arctic Ocean research cruise on the large polar science icebreaker USCGC Healy with SIO oceanographer Jim Swift! Experience the front lines of ocean climate research first hand as we work north from Bering Strait into the Arctic Ocean sea ice pack. Do something wonderful for the La Jolla Symphony & Chorus while assisting the UCSD Scripps Institution of Oceanography with climate research, and enjoy the experience of a lifetime!

Jim - a Research Oceanographer at SIO and second bassoonist in the La Jolla Symphony & Chorus orchestra - is leading a group of four technical specialists from SIO on a 38-day Arctic Ocean research cruise June 12-July 22, 2010. The work is one component of a NASA-funded study, led by Dr. Kevin Arrigo (Stanford), relating to changes in the biological and physical oceanography of the region north of Alaska.

There will be several science teams on board. Jim and his team will be measuring the temperature, salinity, dissolved oxygen, and nutrients via an electronic profiling instrument and by taking and analyzing water samples. The volunteer will work as a full participant, side-by-side with Jim every day preparing the equipment, running the casts, keeping records, drawing water samples, and assisting the other teams.

This unique opportunity is being offered by Jim in appreciation for a substantial donation to LJS&C (the bidding starts at \$15,000). Jim is available to meet and discuss trip details with all bidders. The trip is equally open and suitable for a female or a male, 18 years of age or older. There is no upper age limit, and the work will be only as physically demanding as one chooses, but the participant must be in reasonable physical condition. The bidder/donor can choose to send someone else, but Jim Swift will interview and must approve whoever participates at sea.
