#### Meet our guest conductor



Christopher Rountree is the 31-year-old artistic director, conductor and founder of the adventurous chamber group Wild Up, a 24-piece orchestra that blends new music, classical repertoire, performance art and pop. Known for his lively conducting style, Rountree has been praised by the *Los Angeles Times* for his "infectious enthusiasm" and the *New York Times* for his "elegant clarity." Rountree's work has been featured on both coasts, in *Time Out New York* and the *Los Angeles Times* as "Best in Classical Music."

Wild Up rose to national attention with a long-running 2012 residency at the Hammer Museum in West L.A., where the group staged dozens of events ranging from full orchestra concerts in the courtyard to sonic experiments in the bathrooms. NPR's Performance Today called the group's recent recording of Shostakovich's Chamber Symphony "Searing. Penetrating. And Thrilling."

Rountree's conducting credits include the Los Angeles Philharmonic's Green Umbrella series, San Diego Symphony, Colorado Symphony, Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, and Ensemble LPR, among many others.

Rountree has been Assistant Conductor of the Brooklyn Philharmonic, Guest Conductor at Monday Evening Concerts, and is lecturer in conducting at the University of California, Santa Barbara. He has conducted at the Prototype Festival with Beth Morrison Projects, and has served as Conductor in Residence at the Hammer Museum and with the American Composers Orchestra at UCLA. He has been Artistic Advisor for New Music for the American Youth Symphony and Music Director of the Michigan Pops Orchestra. He has conducted many more orchestras in the

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United States, Europe and Canada including the Winnipeg Symphony, Bohuslav Martinu Philharmonic, American Youth Symphony, Michigan Pops Orchestra, Cabrillo Festival Orchestra and the Rose City Chamber Orchestra in Portland, OR.

In Fall 2013, Rountree began a series of collaborative concerts featuring Wild Up and the Colburn Conservatory of Music, where he serves as both Guest Conductor and Guest Lecturer in Music Business.

Rountree received his Master's degree in orchestral conducting from the University of Michigan in 2009. He has been a student of Larry Rachleff, Marin Alsop, Gustav Meier, Kurt Masur, Catherine Comet, Joana Carneiro, and Kenneth Kiesler.

Rountree is a seventh-generation Californian descended from sheriffs of Santa Cruz County. He fell in love with music as the bassist in a garage band, trombone player in a brass band and watching the Berlin Philharmonic play Brahms and Bartok. Besides being a musician, Rountree is a yogi, unpaid psychoanalyst, cutter of vegetables, storyteller, writer and burrito enthusiast.

### News from the Executive Director ... Diane Salisbury

The March 13 – 15 concerts were truly a success. Artistically, we've never sounded better, and what a spectacular image to see all of our ensemble, members of the San Diego Gay Men's Chorus and extra brass on stage. I actually heard people gasp when they walked into the auditorium. We completely sold out on Sunday, had only a handful of tickets left on the Saturday night performance, and even Friday was 90% full. Financially, this was our most successful concert, grossing over \$32,000 in single ticket sales, while providing our patrons and performers a concert to remember. Bravo, everyone!

We have a unique fundraising opportunity, thanks to horn player Jon Rudin. Jon's mother-in-law is noted watercolor artist Perla Fox, who has donated a collection of numbered and signed, limited-edition serigraphs and lithographs to LJS&C to use for fundraising purposes. We will have her collection on display in the East Room (box office area) of Mandeville Auditorium for people to purchase during the last two concerts. We will be selling the unframed serigraphs and lithographs, valued at \$250 to \$300 each, to our members and patrons for just \$100 apiece – with all proceeds going to LJS&C. 

### Meet Daniel Swem ... Evon Carpenter

La Jolla Symphony is so fortunate to count Dan among its ranks. He has been a loyal member for many years and is a talented musician, composer, conductor and teacher. He played first violin and was concertmaster of the orchestra from 1973 to 1975 and is currently our principal violist, which he became in 1995 when asked by Tom Nee.

Dan is a local talent, born in La Jolla, and grew up in Carlsbad and Oceanside. He began violin at the age of nine in Oceanside Public Schools. His impressive list of



private teachers includes Robert Emile, former concertmaster of the San Diego Symphony, Lawrence Kurkdjie, who was a student of Fritz Kreisler and Joseph Szigeti, Eudice Shapiro, and John Golz, who was a student of Jasha Heifetz.

He graduated from the University of Redlands and holds a Bachelor of Music in violin, a Bachelor of Science in math, and a Master of Music in violin and conducting. He has taught all levels of music, elementary through college. He conducts the North Coast Symphony, a local community orchestra, and has served as choir director for several church choirs. He is the first violinist in a string quartet and displays his diversity as a violinist in the Heliotrope Ragtime Orchestra of San Diego.

In college Dan performed the Copland Sonata for Violin and Piano, with Nick Reveles on piano, for Aaron Copland and was on TV with Copland. He also performed with Itzak Perlman as the page turner in Cage's "Page Turner's Revenge". When Perlman found out that

Dan played the violin, he played the first page of the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto, back stage, just for Dan. When he asked Perlman when he had last performed it in public Itzak answered, "When I was twelve."

When I asked Dan what he particularly likes about being part of the La Jolla Symphony he told me, "I enjoy playing the challenging works, often not performable by other ensembles for various reasons."

This talented musician composes music as a hobby. His works include six string quartets, which have been performed locally, a violin concerto, and various smaller choral pieces.

Dan's family is a musical one. His wife, Cheryl, also plays violin and viola. Son, Jeremy, is a professional brass player with a full-time job as a member of the Disneyland Band and also does freelance trombone, euphonium, and cello gigs in the Los Angeles area. Daughter, Natalie, is a former French horn player.

Not only is Dan very talented, I know him to be a kind, friendly, and immensely patient person. He genuinely helps and encourages community members play and enjoy music. Thank you for being part of LJSC, Dan!
